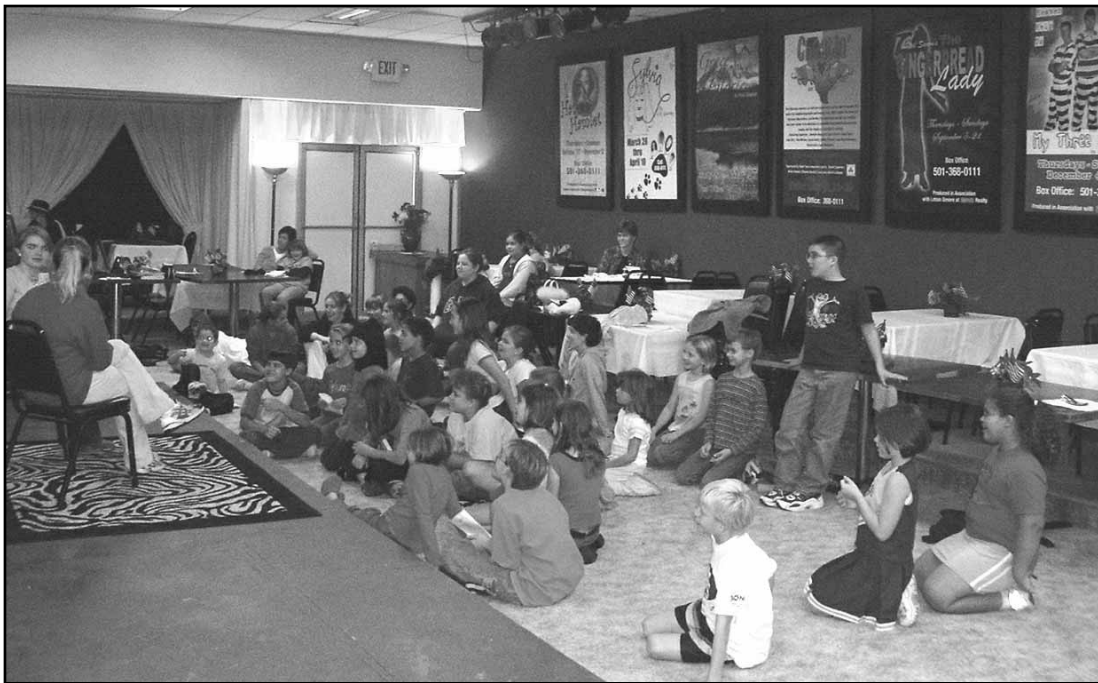


Enroll Now for Children's Theater Workshop in Searcy



Enrollment for the spring session of the Land O'Frost/KidStage children's theater workshop is now ongoing, with the first sessions to kick off January 10 and 11 from 4 p.m. until 6 p.m. at Searcy's Performing Arts Center on the Square, located at 111 West Arch on Searcy's historic court square. The sessions, open to area youngsters aged seven to 17, will culminate with play, "The Wind in the Willows," to be scheduled for mid-April.

Tuition for the class is \$50 per student, with two separate classes held weekly each Monday and Tuesday.

This year, said Center on the Square Executive Director Lana Hallmark, the sessions will take on a bit different form than in

the past.

"We've experienced a steady rate of growth since the KidStage program first began," Hallmark said, "and with the partnership of Land O'Frost in the program, we've grown to the point of needing more classes."

Hallmark said the addition of an additional weekly class will allow the program to serve more area youngsters than has previously been possible. Students will be able to choose which afternoon, Monday or Tuesday, best fits into their schedule.

"The problem we've run into," she said, "which is a good problem to have, is that the classes have grown to the point where we have more kids than roles available in the play

we do each session."

To counter that, Hallmark said the youngsters in each class will form two separate casts for the play, allowing each child greater opportunities when the casts are formed. Both casts will perform in onstage presentations of the play on different nights.

"This gives more of the children the chance to put into practice what they've learned in larger roles," she said. "A tribute to the success of the program is the number of kids who have taken on roles in the dinner shows we do, and they've done very well in those shows."

Keba Rogers will return as the children's director and will direct both versions of "The Wind in the Willows" at the end of the sessions.

Executive Chef Ken Weis offers the freshest menu in town, with freshly cut aged steaks, fresh fish flown in every other day, and the choicest selection of vegetables imaginable. The menu is full but not overwhelming. I had the grilled salmon, and it was unbelievably great. If God had intended fish to taste so good He wouldn't have made cows!
